

Jay L Garfield is Doris Silbert Professor in the Humanities and Professor of Philosophy, Logic and Buddhist Studies and director of the Buddhist Studies and Logic programs at Smith College. He is also Visiting Professor of Buddhist Philosophy at Harvard Divinity School, Professor of Philosophy at Melbourne University and Adjunct Professor of Philosophy at the Central University of Tibetan Studies. He has taught in Australia, Singapore, Japan and Germany and is a regular lecturer at major universities, Buddhist Studies centers and research institutions around the world. Professor Garfield is author or editor of 25 books and over 150 articles and book reviews.

Prof Garfield's research addresses topics in the foundations of cognitive science and the philosophy of mind; the history of Indian philosophy during the colonial period; topics in ethics, epistemology and the philosophy of logic; methodology in cross-cultural interpretation; and Buddhist philosophy, particularly Indo-Tibetan Madhyamaka and Yogācāra. He is current working on a book with Yasuo Deguchi, Graham Priest and Robert Sharf, *What Can't Be Said: Paradox and Contradiction in East Asian Philosophy*; a book on Hume's *Treatise of Human Nature*, *The Concealed Operations of Custom: Hume's Treatise from the Inside Out*; and a large collaborative project on Geluk-Sakya epistemological debates in 15th-18th century Tibet following on Taktshang Lotsawa's *18 Great Contradictions in the Thought of Tsongkhapa* and research with Shaun Nichols on the on the impact of religious ideology on attitudes towards death.

Prof Garfield's most recent books are *The Essential Jewel of Holy Practice* (a translation of Patrul Rinpoche's text of that name, with Emily McRae, Wisdom Publications); *Minds Without Fear: Philosophy in the Indian Renaissance* (with Nalini Bhushan); *Engaging Buddhism: Why it Matters to Philosophy*; *Dignāga's Investigation of the Percept: A Philosophical Legacy in India and Tibet* (with Duckworth et al.); *Moonpaths: Ethics and Emptiness* (with the Cowherds); *Moonshadows: Conventional Truth in Buddhist Philosophy* (with the Cowherds) and (edited, with Jan Westerhoff), *Madhyamaka and Yogācāra: Allies or Rivals?*, all published by OUP. His other books include a translation of Nāgārjuna's *Mūlamadhyamakakārikā (Fundamental Wisdom of the Middle Way)* and (with the ven Geshe Ngawang Samten) of Tsongkhapa's *Ocean of Reasoning: A Great Commentary on Mūlamadhyamakakārikā*.
